Walla Walla High School Campus Additions & Modernizations

Work to renovate the Walla Walla High School Campus was made possible by a successful bond in November 2018 with assistance from Architects West and the Wenaha Group. Further, Architects West and the Wenaha Group assisted Walla Walla Public Schools in petitioning the State of Washington to allow this project to be conducted via the GC/CM delivery method. All work was performed by Jackson Contractor Group under multiple bid packages and multiple

The infrastructure package work occurred first, followed by Phase 1 work for construction of the new 18,000 sf, eight classroom science building. Phase 2 work was the additions and modernizations to seven buildings and campus wide site work. Work included renovation of eight buildings totaling 37.846 sf of new construction additions and 146,223 sf of modernizations.

Site work included replacement of aging site and utility infrastructure, frontage improvements, and improvements to parking, traffic circulation, pedestrian circulation, and landscaping. Site work included five new parking lots totaling 629car parks, bus loops, and a central courtyard core area, and a pedestrian bridge crossing


Walla Walla Schools Today

Free and Reduced Lunch Percentage (All 295 Districts)




How Do Our Students Not in Poverty Perform Compared to Their Statewide Peers?




Statewide Math Assessment (All Districts)

Non-Free and Reduced Lunch




Statewide English Language Arts Assessment (All Districts)

Statewide Science Assessment (All Districts)




How Does our Performance Compare to Districts of Similar Demographics?




Math Scores: Comparison Districts

Quantifiable Data



- Contracted with ECOnorthwest in 2013-14
- Answer 3 questions:
 - •What economic impact do school events have on the local economy?
 - •What is the economic impact from the district hosting outside events?
 - •How many jobs created/ supported by facility usage?



EcoNW Data

Studied events held/hosted during the 2013-14 school year

- During the 2013-14 school year, the District hosted 436 events with a total of 192,661 attendee days.
 - 372 events were the District's internal events
 - 64 were hosted for outside groups at District facilities

EcoNW Results

Visitors to the Hermiston area spent an average of \$60.48 per day

EcoNW Results (cont'd)

District-related vs. community-related events

- Internal Events net impact = \$2.57M
- External Hosted Events net impact = \$3.25M
- •9 yr. projections: Internal = \$34.75M Hosted = \$43.85M








Proposed Capital Improvements as Economic Driver

- Tennis courts
 - Ability to attract district and state tennis
- Baseball/softball lights
 - Ability to attract regional and state-level events
- •Multi-sport complex
 - Ability to attract regional and state-level soccer, football, track and field, marching band and lacrosse events
- Based on ECONW findings
 - Additional ~\$1.5M annual increase in local economic output and labor income







- ✓ More WWPS students are attending post-secondary schooling after graduation than the state!
- ✓ A higher percentage of Walla Walla students are persisting at 4 year, 2 year and trade schools than the state!
- ✓ And a higher percentage of WWPS students end up completing their 4 year, 2 year and trade degrees than the state!
